### **Digitizing Cronicawan**

- Led the digitization, cataloguing, metadata creation, and access design for a bilingual digital archive featuring *Cronicawan*, a 1970s Quechua-language newspaper from Peru in collaboration with the Centro Bartolome de las Casas in Cusco, Peru
- Developed a structured archival database for preservation and discovery using DACS- and EAD-based standards, presented through a static site built with Wax and Jekyll
- Assessed cultural, linguistic, and ethical considerations in preserving Indigenous media, designing for community and scholarly use while maintaining data integrity and respecting original contexts
